ABOUT THE PLAY

It's time for high adventure as Jojo goes on the lookout for all kinds of fascinating flora and fauna in the wilds of his very own yard. What will he find hidden in plain sight? Come along on the trek as we learn, create, and play in this musical mini travelogue about the **hidden natural world** close to home.

These learning plays were created as part of in-school residencies promoting **creative approaches to curriculum elements** in early childhood classrooms. We are proud to present them now at our



museum theatre location at the Smithsonian to encourage everyone to "get in on the act."

Playing 'pretend' as characters in stories encourages **sequencing** (*What comes next?*), **verbal skills** and **vocabulary** (*What color flowers? Why did it happen like that?*), **math** (*How many cupcakes? Let's count the pennies we need to buy the balloon!*), **pre-science** (*What do we need to get these clothes clean?*) and **problem solving** (*Oh no! How can we help?*). Each of these skills is highlighted in plays that surround different themes (zoos, field trips, veterinarians, habitats, etc.).

CREATE YOUR OWN BACKYARD ANIMALS!

What kind of animals would you see in your backyard? Let's try a butterfly!

MATERIALS

- A square sheet of paper, we used origami paper, but printer quality paper or thinner works great too.
- Scissors
- A piece of ribbon, wire or thread

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Begin by cutting your square piece of paper in half
- 2. Take one piece and fold it in half LENGTH ways.
- 3. Open it up and fold in the corners, so you have a rectangle with pointy ends.
- 4. Fold in half again colored side facing out.
- 5. Now you need to "concertina each side". Our concertinas are approximately half a centimeter wide.
- 6. Now take the second strip of your origami paper and start folding it into a concertina across the short width.
- 7. Fold both pieces in half.
- 8. Tie with a ribbon or thread and secure.

HUNGRY? LET'S MAKE SOME TIGER CUPCAKES!

INGREDIENTS

- White cake mix (of your choice)
- 1 Tablespoon cocoa powder
- Black food dye/gel
- Orange food dye/gel
- Plastic ziploc bags
- Cupcake Liners
- Crushed Oreos
- Chocolate frosting
- Gummy worms

DIRECTIONS



- 1. Mix your white cake batter and divide it in half. Add orange food coloring to one half until the desired shade of orange, then add cocoa powder and black food coloring to the other half until black.
- 2. Put the batter into two separate Ziploc bags and cut a tip. Once the liners are in the pan, start by piping orange batter into the center of liner.
- 3. Pipe black batter into the center of your orange batter, then alternate these steps until your liner is 2/3 filled.
- 4. Bake according to the directions on the box. Once cool, either eat or decorate!
- 5. Put chocolate frosting and crushed Oreos on top to make "dirt"
- 6. Add gummy worms on top for an extra treat!


This collection of "My First Pet" books from the American Humane society also has a bilingual option! Learn how to choose, take care of, groom, and keep your new friend healthy in your home!
